

From the archives

Faringdon Advertiser and White Horse Gazette 27th August 1921 Faringdon rural council monthly meeting:

ASHBURY WATER SUPPLY.

A letter was read from Mr Heaton, solicitor to the Craven estate, pointing out that owing to the lamented death of Lord Craven, the proposals made and under consideration with regard to the Ashbury water supply scheme

would have to be postponed.

Mr T. S. Tayler said that the present supply was very short, and people had to go some distance for water. The parish had been without a Vicar since last February, and although there had been several applications, none of them had matured, and he believed the deficient water supply was the reason. He really did not know what to suggest.

The Chairman said that under the circumstances the Council could do nothing, but he suggested that Mr Tayler should make known to the parish the circumstances stated in Mr

Heaton's letter.

Country Matters

As I write these notes on July 18th the start of year's harvest is imminent with oil seed rape and six row winter barley almost ready to cut. The first harvest I took an interest in was 1958 aged fifteen, sixty-six years ago. With only a small 80 acre harvest on a 250 acre farm, 1958 was the last harvest with sheaves, cut by a binder. I remember stacking the sheaves into a Dutch barn with our terrier mousing in a corner. Later she was missing and first thing the next morning we had to dig down where she was last seen and there she was, alive, and she had been getting air beside a stanchion where we had buried her. The 1959 harvest was cut with a new six foot self- propelled bagger MF combine for the first time. Today, our current combine is twenty- four feet cut and grain is managed in bulk.

Father also grew potatoes and sugar beet on a good strip of greensand soil. Beet were loaded into railway wagons, all by hand at Uffington station, bound for the factory at Kidderminster. Another enterprise was hens housed in moveable arcs and moved daily. This was remnant of war time with demand for eggs strong but this may have ceased before 1958. Father also used to grow some long rows of runner beans and I remember picking them and hawking these round the Swindon greengrocers with him before we started cutting in the morning at harvest time. Then we had forty milking cows, all dairy shorthorns tied up in winter in a cowshed and the milk cooled by a plate cooler into churns. Later my brother and I had four dairies and 500 cows and a harvest of 1,000 acres. Today, Eastbrook at Bishopstone have more than 500 cows in two dairies.

In the fields in 1958 our problem weeds were corn marigold and charlock with knotgrass, redshank and field bindweed more of a problem on the heavier soils. Now grass weeds and blackgrass are the main problem. The heavy vale soils were mostly in pasture and unsuitable for arable cropping until underdrains were laid out in the 60's and 70's, all with massive grants. Much of this heavy land would now benefit from returning to grass but most farmers lack the investment and skill to restart a livestock enterprise to make use of the extra grass. I can just remember a corncrake amongst the corn in the 1950's, now they are only found in the Outer Hebrides. English or grey partridges were common. I last saw a turtle dove at Rectory farm in the 1980's. Spotted flycatchers used to nest on an ancient branch of the Virginia creeper climbing the Rectory farmhouse walls. Sparrows were more common. Red kites and ravens are very recent imports. Deer were virtually non-existent and there were many less badgers, but many more rabbits.

How times change.
